Summary & Overall Insights

Parent / Guardian Interviews

Critical Data completed one-on-one executive style telephone interviews with 360 parents
and guardians who have children in Salem-Keizer Public Schools. Of those interviews, 70
were conducted with parents/guardians of high school students, 80 were completed with
parents/guardians of middle school students, and 210 were conducted with
parents/guardians of elementary school students. The interviews were broken out as follows:




- 100% of the 360 respondents confirmed that they have children attending Salem-Keizer Public Schools.
- 73.3% of all study respondents 69.0% of elementary school parents/guardians, 77.5% of middle school parents/guardians, and 81.4% of high school parents/guardians are aware of growth challenges and overcrowding facing Salem-Keizer Public Schools.





 Parents and guardians were provided a list of ten attributes and asked to rank each in their overall importance to them regarding their student's school. Those rated as most important were:


0	Locating special education programs within each high school	4.41
0	Creating and maintaining neighborhood schools	4.35
0	Planning for space for future enrollment growth	4.20
0	Walking route to avoid busy roads, streets, or railroad tracks	4.14








• Of the ten factors rated, the least important factors to parents and guardians were:

0	Attending the same school as siblings	3.74
0	Attending the same schools as neighbors	3.86
0	Cultural, ethnic, and economic equality in schools	3.95
0	State-of-the-art facilities	3.98













 Assuming that their child is safe, parents/guardians were asked to identify the next most important factor regarding where their child attended school. The top response – by nearly five times over the next named factor - is the quality of that school and their teachers.






 In an open-ended question parents and guardians were asked if they had other concerns relating to their child needing to attend another school. While a number of concerns were mentioned, the three concerns most mentioned are:

0	Transportation	24.7%
0	Proximity to our home/walkability	16.1%
0	Quality of the school and their teachers	13.4%






- Two out of three parents/guardians (64.2%) in this study, including 71.3% of middle school parents/guardians, and 58.6% of elementary parents/guardians have no plans to move to another home within the upcoming three or four years.
- Of those who do not plan to remain in their current home, 68.6% still plan to remain and reside within the boundaries of Salem-Keizer Public Schools.
- When those respondents who plan to move, but remain within the district were asked where
 within the district they would like or plan to live, the most named area by three to one over
 the next named area is South Salem





 Parents/guardians were asked what the most important thing for Salem-Keizer Public Schools to consider when embarking upon and implementing this boundary revision process. While a number of responses were offered, the most important were:

0	Overcrowding/class size	19.2%
0	Safety, security, and school climate issues	16.1%
0	Proximity to our home/walkability	11.9%





In Summary

- A high percentage of parents/guardians participating in this study voiced opinions and
 provided input with the district as a whole in mind, often minimizing their own situation. This
 finding will greatly benefit the boundary review team, as it is critically important that
 decisions are made that will benefit the greater district today and for the future.
- Parents/guardians of elementary, middle, and high school students identified similar concerns and values. For example, the top-rated factors important regarding a student's school are the top choices for all three groups – elementary parents/guardians, middle school parents/guardians, and high school parents/guardians:
 - Creating and maintaining neighborhood schools
 - o Locating special education programs within each high school
- When asked the most important thing for Salem-Keizer Public Schools to consider regarding boundary adjustment parents/guardians feel the following issues are most important:

0	Overcrowding/class size	19.2%
0	Safety, security, and school climate issues	16.1%
0	Proximity to our home/walkability	11.9%

- It's important to note that safety, security, and school climate issues are a concern to parents. Further, the idea of moving their child to a different school heightens their concerns of the above.
- In commencing the boundary review process with your teams, it is important to proactively incorporate transportation issues into your team planning. These issues are critically important to parents/guardians of elementary, middle and high school students.
- Parents and guardians overall seem satisfied that the district is doing a good job in maintaining diversity across classroom and cultural lines.
- Based upon the input received from this community study, the following five areas were highlighted as ones to consider when developing boundary revisions:
 - The creation and maintenance of neighborhood schools
 - Overcrowding/classroom size
 - The proximity to home
 - o The ability to address safety concerns when crossing roads, busy streets, or rail tracks
 - o Maintaining safety, security, and school climate
